



WHAT'S HAPPENING

Spring:

For 8 out of the past 10 years, South Carolina has been in a drought situation. Due to all of the recent rainfall, South Carolina may be out of drought conditions; however, with the rise in the water table, other issues are now evident. Springs are springing forth. A major issue is being resolved along Woodside Plantation Drive between Winged Elm and Cottonwood. A new drainage system stretching over 1,000 feet and comprised of solid pipes and French drains is being installed to handle the spring water flowing down and across the street. Another spring also caused the walking path to collapse close to Summer Squall Lane. Repairs are being pursued.

2016 Landscaping Budget Finalized:

The Board approved the landscaping budget for 2016 at \$631,000 to pay for scheduled contracted work and unscheduled maintenance, irrigation repairs, electricity, water, the garden plot area, apportioned salaries for POA staff, Firewise, and mowing of the vacant lots. This represents an increase of \$31,000 from the 2015 budget. The increase is driven mainly by the following: (1) the addition of new areas to POA responsibility; (2) budgeting for additional lime application and aeration to promote improved soil health; (3) Firewise; and (4) repair of several areas that require either sod or ground cover. In the January article, I will provide the 2015 actual costs incurred in each cited line item vs the 2015 and 2016 budgets for each item.

The approved 2016 budget for special projects is \$46,375, a reduction of \$12,605 from the 2015 budget of \$58,980. Special projects include step

replacement at the gardens; replacement of trees and bushes removed and /or damaged by the ice storm and tornado, pruning of trees along our roadways, and replacement of some aged plantings. Specific details will be itemized in future editions of the newsletter.

Deer Control Tip:

At this time of year, the deer are looking for their winter feeding grounds, and making a list of the best "restaurants" in town. According to the Aiken Master Gardener Association, Milorganite, (an inexpensive fertilizer), is frequently used as a deer repellent by gardeners, farmers, and nurseries and does not break down as fast as liquid repellents. Spread it around your flower beds and trees and on top of your pine straw. If you are using other deer control products, be sure to continue using them throughout the winter. Remember, when the deer can no longer smell the repellents, they will return in a heartbeat.

Holiday Safety: Yes, the holidays are here, and

Christmas trees, lights, and candles will soon be everywhere, while celebrations and family gatherings commence, and guests fill our homes to celebrate the season. As a result, some added caution should be taken. According to a National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) report, U.S. fire departments responded to more than 200 home structure fires annually from 2002 to 2005 that began with Christmas trees. Each year fires occurring during the holiday season injure 2,600 individuals and cause over \$930 million in damage, according to the United States Fire Administration. Electrical failures or malfunctions were involved in nearly half of the fires, while nearly a quarter

occurred because a heat source was located too close to the tree. Decorative lights with live voltage were involved in more than 20 percent of the instances. Electrical malfunctions can also ignite artificial trees and homeowners should take the same precautions in terms of tree placement and decorations as they would with a real tree.

- 1. If you are using a fresh tree, choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.
- 2. Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 1" to 2" from the base of the trunk.
- 3. Make sure the tree (real or artificial) is at least 3 feet away from any heat source.
- 4. Add water to the tree daily.
- 5. While extension cords are a convenient way to supply power right where you need it for your holiday decorations, they can also create hazards if not used safely.
- 6. Use lights that have the label of an independent testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- 7. Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini string sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of LED strands to connect.
- 8. Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.
- 9. Get rid of the tree when it begins dropping needles. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home. According to the NFPA even a well-watered tree should be taken down after four weeks.

In closing, I wish all of you a safe, healthy, and peaceful holiday season. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!


A Decade of Making a Difference in Woodside

Treasurer's Report | December, 2015 | Lynette Brumfield

 $oldsymbol{\mathsf{C}}$ ince I was elected in September and became $oldsymbol{\circ}$ Treasurer of the Board, my primary responsibility has been working with the Directors on the 2016 budget. The Board had been engaged in ongoing discussions about the budget since August. The final changes and updates to the 2016 budget were completed and approved at the November Board meeting of the. The budget requires a 5.2% increase in annual assessments to \$810 for dwellings and \$405 for unimproved lots. It also includes a 15% contribution to the Designated Reserve Fund.

There were several items added to the budget in order to maintain, repair and improve the overall budget were completed conditions of the Plantation, which include:

- Wooden bridge inspections.
- Walking path repairs.
- which may offset the costs)

- Resident directory printing and mailing (last directory printed in October 2014).
- Security man hours increased at the Village gate.
- Ridge Oaks, Pine Glen, and Twin Ponds sections transitioned to the POA from the development company.
- Bi-annual inspection of Holley, Burden, Royal, Oakman and Magnolia Lakes.
- Continued landscaping replacements due to the ice storm and tornado damage.

The annual assessment notices will be mailed this month with a copy of the 2016 budget. Final assessment payment is due by March 1, 2016 without penalty. If you have not received your assessment notice by the end of December, please contact the POA office for a duplicate.

OFFICER OF THE MONTH


Angela Poe

Approval of Minutes:

There being no additions or corrections, the minutes of the October 19th, 2015 board meeting stand approved as written.

President's Comments:

President Larry Wittenmyer informed the Board that the placement of the septic tank at the Village gate guard facility is complete and as a result the guards can remain at the gatehouse to effectively and efficiently manage the gate.

Resident Comments: Mr. Tolerico offered his suggestions as to budgeting for future road repaving.

Reports and Motions:

Lynette Brumfield our Treasurer presented to the Board the 2016 budget for approval. The Budget was approved unanimously.

Diana Peters updated on the Board on property transfers to the Association and the status of new restaurants in the Village.

Linda Rudd on Covenants continues to work on her efforts to educate residents on the risk associated with feeding the deer.

Mary Shultz updated us on plantings, the treatment of rye grass, and the deer survey. Again, the Board is appreciative of the high rate of participation in our survey and all the helpful comments. She is also involved in investigating landslides in the Winged Elm area, due to water on the hillside possibly from underground springs. She also proposed resolving issues associated with spring water running across the road at Woodside Plantation Drive between Winged Elm and Cottonwood. A French drain will need to be installed to take the water to the storm drain.

Greg Hoffman continues his inspection of the many miles of fence that protects and enhances our community. Virtually all of this must be done by foot.

John Rogers, updated the Board on the status of the walking path on Woodside Plantation Drive at the intersection of Summer Squall. Sinkholes had formed in several locations do to underground springs. John is involved in assessing the repairs as well as determining if there is a solution to avoid this happening in the future. He also updated the Board on the replacement of light bulbs on our street lights, they came by to work on the fixture at my house on Wednesday and I can tell everyone the difference is remarkable.

Dave Rodgers updated the Board as to the status of a vacancy on the ARB Board, announcing Jerry Hughson will serve on the board, continuing Jerry's tradition of volunteering his intellect and experience in service to our community.

Dan Franck reported ongoing discussions as to whether it is necessary to provide additional rock fill at Holley Lake dam due to runoff and lack of vegetation in certain areas.

Greg Burkes continues his audit of the RV lot to make sure it is safe, sound, and efficient for those who use it. Also he continues to diligently work to bring our new web page to life.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:05PM
