POA Board Changes

At the Annual WPPOA meeting on September 10, the newly elected board members – Greg Burkes, Mary Shultz and John Rogers – were announced. Immediately following the Annual Meeting, the board members elected the 2013/2014 officers – Dee Clark, Secretary; Pat Shippey, Treasurer; Larry Wittenmyer, Vice-President; and I was elected President. I am pleased and honored to take on this challenge and pledge to do my best for Woodside. Please join me in congratulating the new board directors and officers. I think we have a great collection of smart, committed residents who will not only maintain, but improve upon the integrity of Woodside.

I would be remiss if I did not thank our departing board members – Mike Sims, Bob Christopher and Bob Horne – for their time, efforts and contribution. They will be missed. As well, I would like to thank my predecessor Bill Lykins for his board leadership the last couple of years. Fortunately, Bill has agreed to remain on the board and focus on roads, streetlights and walking paths.

As has already been announced, the proposed changes to the amendment regarding leasing or renting of a dwelling unit passed. This information was not shared with the attendees at the Annual Meeting. Typically voting results regarding changes to the covenants are not announced at the Annual Meeting because we want to be absolutely sure of the results. Electing board members requires a simple majority. Passing a covenant change requires a 75% majority approval. I've been told that years ago there was a mistake in a covenant change vote count and the results were incorrectly reported. Therefore, the habit of delaying reporting covenant changes results was born.

Strategic Planning

This coming year will be a year of planning. Nearly five years ago, a committee of residents created a five-year strategic plan for Woodside. They interviewed board members, then used their expertise to recommend a five-year plan with high level overall objectives as well as specific functional goals. It is time to update that plan. To that end, I am looking for volunteers with strategic planning experience who would be willing to participate on a committee tasked with developing a new five year plan. Speeding

One of the most alarming issues in Woodside is speeding and stop sign violations. This is nothing new. The problem has been with us for over ten years, and with the increase in the number of residents and streets, it is only getting worse. Over those years, previous boards have struggled to find solutions. Some residents feel we need to install speed humps and more stop signs to attempt to slow down drivers. While this may be a good solution, it is also controversial. We've all traveled through other communities that employ speed humps – they are unpleasant to drive over and some believe they reduce property values. This is why previous boards have been reluctant to install them. The current board has discussed this again and the feeling is still one of reluctance.

I believe that all of us should be aware of the dangers that are posed by speeding and running stop signs. We now have nearly 1900 homes and 5,000 people living in Woodside. Sooner or later someone will be hurt, or worse yet, killed due to these infractions. Therefore, over the coming months, you will see an increased use of the "speed sentry" throughout the Plantation. This device will allow us to determine areas that need stronger and more frequent enforcement by ADPS. The average citation will cost you more than \$200 or more and result in "points" on your license. None of us likes to get stopped by the police, but we must get the message out! I ask that every one of us pay attention to the speed limits (25 to 30 MPH) and make full stops at stop signs. If we all do our part, we can avoid speed humps and make Woodside a safer community for our families. I thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

Holiday Inflatables

We are now into fall with winter fast approaching and the holiday season looming just around the corner. Last year on September 13, we, the property owners of Woodside Plantation, voted to amend Article 1, Section 9 of the forty-fourth amendment to the covenants. To paraphrase the amendment: no holiday inflatables shall be displayed except with the written permission of the ARB. If such permission is granted, the ARB reserves the right to restrict size, color and content of such inflatables.

Since the ARB has been designated to regulate holiday inflatables, we have developed a "Holiday Inflatable Approval request form," available at the POA office. There is no fee associated with the request form; however, the fine schedule listed in Section 6.6 of the Building and Landscape Guidelines will apply for non-compliance.

The following criteria are listed on the approval form:

- > No holiday inflatable may be displayed without prior written approval by the ARB.
- Holiday inflatables may be displayed not more than two weeks prior to the holiday and removed no later than one week after the holiday.
- > Holiday inflatables are restricted to less than ten feet in height.
- ► Holiday inflatables may be lighted so long as they do not interfere with the quiet enjoyment of the residents within the surrounding area.
- > The location and a description of the inflatable is required.

Party inflatables, i.e. birthdays, anniversaries, etc., may be used for a maximum of three days and will not require approval from the ARB; however, residents must inform the POA office of their use and installation. Party inflatables must also adhere to the holiday inflatables' guidelines.

If you have any questions regarding the display of inflatables within the Plantation, please check with the POA office.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Income and Expenses

Non-assessment income remains at the same level as last year at this time. Expenses are 2.4% above 2012 levels, but are below budget estimates. Eighteen lots have been sold through September. Hopefully, this will translate to 18 new dwellings next year.

Work continues on next year's budget. The board will vote on the 2014 assessment rates at the November board meeting.

C.E.E.C. (COVENANTS)

New Director for Covenants

Let me start my first newsletter by saying thank you for your support and vote of confidence. Driving around the Plantation and seeing how remarkably well the properties are maintained underscores one of the reasons we want to live here. The views are very pleasant and certainly add value to our investment. The covenants we all agreed to when we purchased our property are not only an obligation on our part, but also an affirmation from our neighbors that they will maintain their property as well. Our covenants work both ways and are the underpinning of our remarkable community and why others want to move here. (And if you really need to fall asleep, read the covenants. I'm sleeping well lately).

As Director of Covenants, my responsibility is to respond to complaints regarding covenant violations. For the most part, a simple letter from the POA to the property owner brings an immediate correction 98% of the time. People do care!

Regrettably, there are a few instances when a fine is imposed if corrections are not forthcoming.

My first month has been quite an eye opener as to the amount of effort and coordination it takes to run and support Woodside including the incredible amount of detail handled by the POA staff to enable our neighborhood of 2,000 or so families to function smoothly ... from decals to dams, from horses to road reflectors and from budgets to security and much, much more ... (fortunately only a small part of all this has to do with covenants).

After less than a month, my learning is by no means complete but in my "initiation" I am impressed by the scope of activities that are dealt with daily by the POA staff and volunteers on our behalf so we can enjoy life here.

Ensure that the WPPOA facilities are maintained to be well-functioning and aesthetically pleasing

The WPPOA board wants to communicate with you, the resident, in a way that is cost effective, efficient, timely and that communicates the intent in a way that reduces or eliminates misunderstanding. Communication is somewhat like soft drink advertising – Pepsi advertisements include the use of displays in stores, billboards, radio and TV commercials and by sponsoring different events. Pepsi doesn't just use one method because people receive information in different ways.

WPPOA communication needs to be similar. While we probably don't want a big flashing billboard at the front gate, we are going to work at finding the best ways we can communicate to you, our customer, the Woodside resident.

Welcome New Board Members

Treatment of Lakes

Granite Ridge Aquatic Services report for the month of September (with editorial comments by yours truly):

- 1. Treated Burden Lake for floating hearts
- 2. Treated Royal Lake for alligator weed. The water level was down (we sure could use some rain!), so we should have good coverage.
- 3. Added dye to the retention pond on Winged Elm.
- 4. Inspected Magnolia Lake---will need a treatment for floating hearts on next visit.
- 5. Holley Lake has an abundance of floating hearts, but we must coordinate with the golf course for us to spray...due to the lack of rain, they have been irrigating heavily from Holley, and the superintendent is concerned about putting too many chemicals from the lake on the golf course. They have (or will) be overseeding, which requires heavy watering also. As soon as we get clearance, we will treat Holley.

Note: I know we were "complaining" earlier this summer about too much rain, and not getting effective results from spraying, and now we're "complaining" about it being too dry. It is a "delicate" balance, so if you see floating hearts or alligator weed, be assured we are aware, and be patient.

Next month I will publish "directions" on how to access each of our lakes, so if you want to fish, you will know how to get there. See you next month! Jerry

Woodside Plantation is a beautiful place to live; I still remember the day my husband and I drove through the gate for the first time while looking at the community as a potential place to build a home. Our reaction was an immediate "this is the place." My goal is to ensure that we as residents continue to enjoy the beauty of Woodside and that potential buyers continue to have that same reaction when they look at the Plantation. That goal obviously must be achieved in a cost-effective manner, so I will also be looking to reduce our costs where possible.

Thank you for entrusting me to represent your interests on the WPPOA board. I look forward to serving our community.

What's Happening

- 1. Some of the common areas were over seeded with winter rye grass towards the end of September; therefore, those areas are being watered to ensure good seed germination and seedling growth. Due to the seed germination, mowing cannot occur for three weeks following the over seeding.
- 2. The pine trees are shedding significant number of needles this year, with quite a few trees looking more brown than green. There is no issue with the trees; they remain healthy and will sprout new needles.
- 3. Towards the end of October, the beds will be planted with fall plantings.

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

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
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
