PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

On July 24, we hosted our first Town Hall meeting. If you missed it, you missed a good one. The topic was safety and emergency services. Chief Barranco, Captain Turno and Captain Brazier from Aiken Public Safety, as well as Tommy Thompson, Paul Matthews and David Ruth from Emergency Services were our guest speakers. They discussed the services provided by the City and the County, then willingly answered questions from the 90+ residents who were in attendance. We owe a big thank you to Greg Burkes and Melanie Brock for putting this all together.

Two volunteer programs were mentioned – the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program and the Volunteer First Responder program. Both are designed to enable citizens to take an active role in addressing emergency situations. In overly simplified terms, they work like a neighborhood watch, except the focus is medical emergencies and disaster preparedness, not crime. The CERT program educates people for disaster preparedness (e.g. fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations). The Volunteer First Responder program educates people to be an immediate responder to an individual medical or other neighbor emergency.

If we think either of these programs is right for Woodside residents, the City and/or County will provide instruction and oversight guidance. Please let us know if you would be interested in participating (or even just learning more about) either of these programs by sending an email to WPPOA@WPPOA.com. If we have sufficient interest, we will pursue this.

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COMMON AREA LANDSCAPING

Mary H Shultz STORM DAMAGE UPDATE: Considering the amount of work that has been done this year since the storm, and the

considerable amount we have spent, due to budgetary constraints no additional work will be done this year to clean up storm debris. Work on the debris clean up in common areas will begin again in 2015.

The dam areas around Oakman, Royal, Holley, and Burden Lakes were cleaned up with dead trees, hangers and brush removed from the dams and surrounding areas. This action was prompted by the dam safety review conducted by Jerry Hughson. The clean up of Magnolia Lake dam will be done in 2015.

The City of Aiken assisted with the removal of hangers and leaning trees that infringed on the road right-of-way at approximately 12 locations throughout the Plantation. FEMA regulations limited what the City could do for us.

WOODED AREA MANAGEMENT PLAN: Three representatives from The South Carolina Forestry Commission visted Woodside on July 15 to tour our heavily wooded areas. After touring several buffer areas, all of the wooded areas along Woodside Plantation Drive and some areas along our perimeter fence, the general concensus was that our wooded areas were for the most part healthy. Two concerns were voiced from the perspective of maintaining healthy wooded areas and one concern was voiced from a safety perspective. In order to maintain a healthy wooded area, the foresters indicated several areas that would benefit from thinning due to too many very tall, extremely thin trunked trees. Their other concern was the overgrowth of the vines and they provided some recommendations on how to deal with them. From a safety perspective, after touring the buffer areas and the fence line, they indicated many places where the accumulation of dead leaves, downed branches and dried bushes provided significant fuel for a fire hazard. They recommneded we review a program called FIREWISE Communities (www.firewise.org) to learn more about community self action which can reduce the risk of a fire. In the near future, we will be visiting Savannah Lakes, a community that has been active in the program for quite some time, to learn more regarding the implementation of this program. The recommendations presented by the Forestry Commission representatives will be built into our long term planning and budgeting.

WHAT'S HAPPENING: You may have noticed the huge piles of mulch at the Community Garden center and the distribution of mulch along several roadsides. The mulch was provided and delivered to us free of charge by the City. Cold Creek is in the process of distributing the mulch along the wooded areas under trees where it is very difficult to grow grass due to the acidity of the soil as well as the amount of shade. Our thanks are extended to the homeowners in the vicinity of the mulch pile who tolerated the view of the mountain of mulch.

Cold Creek was busy testing and adjusting the sprinkler heads throughout the Plantation during the latter part of July. In addition, the interior of Sterling Grove Circle was cleaned up; downed trees and dead brush was removed and the area was mowed. We plan to keep the circle maintained. Some additional landscaping will be done in the future.


Summerhill Park Update...

ARB

We are a community of patriots, sports enthusiasts, alma mater devotees and seasonal flag-wavers. Since we live in a community governed by Covenants and Building and Landscape Guidelines, we of course have policies regarding the use of our flags.

First, free standing flagpoles may not exceed 21 feet in height and require ARB approval. One American flag may always be displayed following United States Flag protocols.

Second, the flag may be displayed either on a free standing flagpole or a pole attached to a home or deck. The home or deck pole should not exceed six feet and display on a tree or mailbox post is not permitted. Moreover, the flag must be in good condition. Third, one additional flag may be displayed concurrently such as a school flag, sports flag or seasonal flag. The above rules apply to these flags as well. In addition, the flag must not be offensive and not be religious or political in nature.

Banners may be displayed for a short period of time such as Independence Day, Memorial Day, and Flag Day. They must not exceed two feet in height and be confined to decking.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding flags, please contact the POA office. As a reminder, if you are considering a free standing pole, please request approval from the ARB.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The 2015 budget process began in July. Each director is responsible for submitting income and expense projections in the area(s) of his or her responsibility. A preliminary budget will be ready for Board review by the middle of August. The final budget will be adopted at the November Board meeting after new directors have had an opportunity to review and comment on it.

The list of five delinquent properties was forwarded to the attorney this month to begin the lien process. Assessment income for the 12 new lots in the Summer Hill section of Hollow Creek (Phase IV) was received this month as well as Working Capital assessments from the Developer's sale of three lots. The Developer has sold fifteen (15) lots through July. This is the same number that was sold at this time last year.

We have received 97% of the projected budgeted income for the year with 5 more months to go. Expenses in all categories remain under budget. The state of South Carolina has determined that homeowners' associations are not eligible for ice storm clean-up expense reimbursement from FEMA. Our clean-up expenses used up most of the association's carryover Operating Account surpluses that had accumulated over the past 25 years, however, there is still \$809,963 in the Reserve Fund. After the remaining fence repairs are completed, we anticipate a Reserve balance of at least \$800,000 at the end of the year.

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LAKES AND DAMS

Before I give my Lakes and Dams update, I would like to ask all reading this to be sure and mail in your ballot for the election of new Board members and the proposed change to the Covenants. It's important. Also, please put September 9th (Tuesday) on your calendar and attend the WPPOA Annual Meeting at 6PM at the Woodside Plantation Country Club. We would like to see a record turnout this year!

I have been around looking at our "lakes" and they all look in excellent shape, although the water levels are a little low, which is typical this time of year when rainfall has been scarce. Our contractor, Granite Ridge Aquatic Services, is doing an excellent job of keeping noxious weeds under control. They made two trips to Woodside in July, treating Magnolia and Burden for floating hearts, Royal for alligator weed on their first visit, and treating Holley Lake for floating hearts, water primrose, and other noxious plants on their second visit. All of the lakes were inspected and future treatment scheduled.

Downed trees and branches from the ice storm have now been cleared from the dam areas of all our dams. We have also begun the process of correcting the minor discrepancies from our recent dam inspections.

COVENANTS

This simple advice could be more important than you think. The Town Meeting of Woodside residents on July 24th went very well as others have mentioned. The Public Safety takeaway for me was the "what to do in an emergency situation".

- Stay on the line cell or land line
- Unlock your doors
- Put on the outside lights

This will work very well at night with the outside lights as a bright beacon. But in the daytime, your mailbox will be the key locator to find your residence quickly since the emergency vehicles do not have GPS. Unfortunately, some of our mailboxes have gone into the "witness protection program" it seems – rusting, without an address or just very difficult to read. This does not bode well for you in an emergency.

Hopefully, very few of us will have to summon emergency vehicles where minutes may count. Nonetheless, in non-emergency situations your mailbox address is very helpful in day-to-day situations. For example, consider how helpful it is in finding your residence when new acquaintances are visiting. And while the postman may know your location, perhaps by trial and error over many years, don't forget that vendors you

SECURITY

CODE RED WEATHER WARNING: At our recent Town Hall Meeting, we had representatives from ADPS and the Fire Department. One of the topics discussed was storm warnings. The system is called CODE RED, which calls your home to warn you of an approaching storm, such as severe thunderstorms, flash floods or tornados. This is a very good system as it augments a weather radio or other warnings from TV, etc. You can sign up by going to www.aikencountysc.gov and click on the Code Red logo. When they call you, the caller ID will show their number (800-566-9780) and your number is kept private. If you're away from home, when the call comes in, you can dial the 800 number back to hear the latest message. There is no cost, to you, to sign up and use the system.

SMOKE ALARMS: Did you know that your smoke alarms have a birthday? I'm not talking about the annual battery change. If your smoke alarms are 10 years old, they need to be replaced! I didn't know this, but Aiken Fire Department personnel stated that because the sensors

called, or FedEx, UPS and Mr. Amazon may not have a clue without some help from your mailbox.

It is common sense, and the law, that your residence be adequately marked to aid emergency vehicles. Our covenants by require standardization of our mailboxes size, color and lettering.

So why not spruce up your mailbox and consider it a very helpful lawn ornament!

New Woodside mailboxes, with your address affixed, can be purchased thru the POA office for only \$60 and that includes installation on the old post. (However, if all you need is the lettering the POA office provides this for \$10, which you can apply, or they can apply it to your mailbox for an additional \$10.)

Paint for the mailbox post is also available from the POA office for free. The post can be painted in about 10 minutes, maybe 15 if you want more paint on the post than the ground.

Surprisingly, the simple upkeep of your mailbox is really more important and useful than you might have thought. *****



can break down over 10 years, the alarm should be replaced. Also, hard-wired alarms operate 92% of the time; battery powered alarms operate 77% of the time. It is also recommended that hard-wired alarms be interconnected on all floors. When interconnected they were more likely to operate and alert occupants to a fire.

BICYCLES: Over the past several years the Plantation has seen an increase in residents riding bicycles on our streets. While this is an excellent way to exercise and enjoy nature, it does pose some problems for motorists as well as the bicyclists. We all need to be mindful that people are riding on the streets and exercise due caution when driving over a hill or around a curve as you may encounter someone on a bicycle. While most bicyclists pay attention to motorists, sometimes they don't, so please be alert. Also, I would ask our bicyclists to always ride single file, or move into single file when an automobile is coming up from behind. Let's all work together to respect each other and avoid any mishaps.



ROADS, STREETLIGHTS, SIGNS & WALKING PATHS Bill Lykins

The WPPOA Board has been working on an updated strategic plan to address the long range needs and financial planning needed to accomplish various projects. Each Director will be preparing a plan to cover their area of responsibility. I have personally been working on the potential needs and associated cost of our road system in the next 10 years. It appears that during this time span, the WPPOA will have to repair and pave potentially 52 streets. This seems like a huge number and one would wonder why so many will need attention within the next 10 years.

During the first twenty years of Woodside Plantation construction of our infrastructure was not built on a

continual yearly expansion. After the initial section was started and the infrastructure put in place, the future expansion was based on demand for new housing. During the time period of 1990 through 2008 86 streets were built. Asphalt pavements have a normal life cycle of 18 years before repairs are needed. Some of these streets have already been resurfaced but the majority will need work by year 2023.

Without boring you with the calculations, our potential cost for road repairs over the next 10 years could potentially be in the neighborhood of \$2,500,000. In addition to the above the WPPOA will also be incurring cost to rehab our walking paths.

Vendors are NOT your guests. They are to be called in passes to enter the East Gate or Anderson Pond Gate ONLY! The Main gate is not to be used as a vendor entrance. Please help us maintain the integrity of our access gates.
